### Every Student Succeeding — State Schools Strategy 2016–2020

For over a year, Every student succeeding — State Schools Strategy 2014–2018 has served as a useful guide for principals and staff. The strategy has now been updated to reflect current priorities, and maintain relevance and currency. Aligned with [Advancing education: An action plan for education in Queensland](#), the updated [Every student succeeding — State Schools Strategy 2016–2020](#) will ensure we stay on track to lift outcomes for all Queensland state school students. Reforms to education in Queensland are making a difference. There is greater access to kindy, a full-time Prep year, Year 7 in high school and the Queensland Certificate of Education. As a result:

- more Queensland children take part in kindy than ever before
- NAPLAN improvements are outpacing the nation, particularly in Year 3
- more Queensland students, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students, are successfully completing Year 12
- state schools continue to record high levels of parent and student satisfaction.

The plan will build on these reforms to deliver a world-class education system. Children and young people are preparing for a very different future from that of their parents and schools are changing to meet these new demands. State schools will inspire students to become:

- Lifelong learners who are knowledge creators, technology savvy, problem solvers, innovators and effective communicators who share ideas with others and respond positively to change.
- Global citizens who have relationships based on fairness and tolerance are culturally competent and able to connect locally and globally
- Successful people who set goals, are resilient, able to create opportunities and are confident in pursuing their passions.

This plan builds on the progress we have already made and outlines the actions we are taking now, and in the future, to deliver our long-term vision for Queensland.

### Technology Advancements

The rapid advancement of technology is astonishing. Emerging developments like self-driving cars, artificial intelligence and robotics are becoming more and more sophisticated and integrated into our daily lives. I can't wait for the robot that can cook, clean, iron and do my grocery shopping! But really, who knows where we are headed next? Who knows where technology will have taken us by the time our current Prep students graduate from Year 12.

Ensuring our students are digitally literate and prepared for the future is one of our newest challenges. In recognition of this, the Queensland Government, through [Advancing Education](#), (<http://advancingeducation.qld.gov.au/Pages/default.aspx>) has committed to fast-track the implementation of the Australian Curriculum: Digital Technologies, which includes coding and robotics. New curriculum resources have been released to support schools wishing to implement the Digital Technologies curriculum. In addition, there are a number of existing coding clubs and organisations that work with schools. For example:

- [FIRST Australia](#): FIRST designs accessible, innovative programs that motivate young people to pursue opportunities in STEM, while building self-confidence, knowledge and life skills.
- [Code Club Australia](#): Code Club Australia's mission is to give every child in Australia the chance to learn to code by providing project materials and a volunteering framework that supports the running of after-school coding clubs.
- [Robogals](#): Robogals is an international university-student-run organisation that aims to increase female participation in STEM through fun and educational initiatives.
- [NCSS Challenge](#): The NCSS Challenge is a programming competition for secondary school students. It has been running in Australia for the past nine years, and this year it is open to all schools.

This is by no means a comprehensive list — I'm sure there will be many exciting opportunities for students to learn about digital technologies in 2016. Let's help ensure our students are prepared for all of the new opportunities in the digital world.

### New School Closures Website Launched

DET's Emergency and Security Management Unit has launched a new website <http://closures.det.qld.gov.au> which provides detailed information on closed educational facilities (including state schools, non-state schools and early childhood education and care services) during a natural disaster or emergency event.

### New Autism Hub

The Department of Education and Training is committed to improving educational outcomes for students with autism spectrum disorder (ASD). There are a wide range of dedicated ASD support services, initiatives and programs offered by Queensland government and non-government agencies. The Autism Hub will build upon these solid foundations by becoming a hub dedicated to supporting students, their families and educators access and navigate available strategies, programs and resources.

The Autism Hub has four guiding principles in its work:

#### Making a difference for students

- Students with ASD attend their local school alongside same age peers with appropriate additional support provisions where necessary;
- Potential barriers to participation and learning are proactively addressed to ensure that students develop as positive and confident learners in a safe, supportive connected and inclusive environment;
- High expectations are reinforced for student achievement and engagement through a personalised learning approach.

#### Making a difference for schools

- Alignment between whole school, class wide and personalised support systems is prioritised to embed an inclusive culture in which outcomes for all students are optimised;
- Staff value students, have positive regard for the diverse abilities students bring to their classrooms and believe that as educators they can make a difference;
- Access to information, evidence-based teaching strategies and personnel with ASD expertise through a coordinated systematic delivery approach is made available to all schools.

### Making a difference for parents

- Parents are engaged as genuine partners in their children's education and provided with opportunities to express their aspirations for their child;
- Parents are invited to contribute to planning personalised support systems for their child and any reasonable adjustments necessary to support their child's access and participation in high quality education;
- Parents are vital partners in supporting successful learning outcomes for their child.

### Making a difference for the community

- Community engagement and collaborative partnerships are established to support the work of the Autism Hub in providing evidenced-based and innovative responses.

### Interscholar Sport

Children in years 5 and 6 are now gearing up for their first Gala Day of interschool sport – starting on 11<sup>th</sup> of March. Very soon we will be running through team selection and training and we are sure this will be a wonderful experience for our year 5 students as they experience their first taste of interschool sport. Good luck to all of our competitors. We are sure Mount Warren Park will again be the team to beat! Please ensure that all children have all necessary safety equipment for their required sport and that they wear their hat, sunscreen, have a water bottle and school uniform for their events.

### Scooters and Bikes

Please help us to keep our grounds safe by reminding your children not to ride their bikes and scooters through the school grounds. Bikes and scooters must be housed in the bike racks and please ensure that they are chained to the racks during the day. We recommend that skateboards are not brought to school as they cannot be chained up and they should not be taken to class.



### New Drop off Zone

After much consultation with the school and the P and C, we would like to thank Councillor Don Peterson for his support in having the council revitalise the parking lines around the school and making a drop off zone in the top car park. Entry to the car park will now be via one of two lanes. The left lane is to enter the drop off zone where a 2 minute waiting time limit applies while the right lane gives entry to the parking area. The drop off zone helps to ensure

the safety of our children as they do not have to cross any traffic areas to be picked up and we ask that all parents follow the two minute maximum parking rule to allow clear and easy access.

### Emergency Procedures Drills

In the near future our school will be holding emergency procedure drills. These drills will consist of either evacuation or lockdown drills and help us to evaluate our school safety procedures and to help prepare the students in the event of an emergency. Please inform your child of these events and stress to them the importance of remaining calm and sensible during the drills.



### Hair Style

Your child's hair should be styled in a neat and respectable manner. Coloured hair or outrageous styles are not permitted. This includes Mohawk style haircuts and tracks. You will be asked to correct such cuts.

### Playground Equipment

Our school Workplace Health and Safety requirements need for us to ensure that school playground equipment is only to be used at the designated times during school hours and only by children authorised to use the equipment. Please ensure that children do not play on the playground equipment outside of school hours as we do not provide supervision at these times.

### Cash Collection Procedures – Cash Window

The Cash Window is located in the Admin Block. We offer several methods of payment being cash, cheque, EFTPOS, B-Point (see above) and Internet Banking. The cash window will be **OPEN every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 8am to 10am.**

**Late Payments** - It is a solid requirement that all events be paid for by the due date which is stated on all permission / information notes sent home to parents.

Late payments cannot be accepted under any circumstances so please keep updated by checking our newsletter each fortnight.

**Refunds** - Refunds can only be given in part. This means if there is bus travel involved for the event this is **NOT** refundable. Whether your child attends or not the buses have been booked and need to be paid for. You must complete a "Refund Request" Form available from Administration.

**Payment Due Dates** - Every fortnight payment reminders are printed in the "General News" and "Dates To Remember" sections of the school newsletter (this is also available on our website).



**Dance Groups** - All children who have successfully gained a position in a Dance Group, will very soon receive an invoice attached to an information note. **All members must pay \$20 by Thursday 3 March.** Students who do not pay by this date will forfeit their position as there is a lengthy waiting list and the position must be offered to another.

**Week 4: I play respectfully with others.** This looks like:


1. I wait my turn on equipment.

### Interschool Sport - Gala Days Year 5 and 6

Mt Warren Park State School will again participate in the Beenleigh Zone Interschool Sport Competition throughout 2016. This year the competition will run over 5 half days in Term 1/2 and then again in Term 4. Each team will play at least 2 games per half day: - 11.00am to 2.15pm. The cluster of interschool sports offered to students in Term 1 and 2 will be Netball, Soccer, Rugby League, AFL and Girls Touch Football.

- **Competition dates for Term 1 - Friday 11<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> March and continuing in Term 2 - 15<sup>th</sup>, 22<sup>nd</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup> April.**
- Throughout the first two weeks of Term 1 students have been asked to sign up for their sport preference.
- This Friday 12<sup>th</sup> February - last session of the day the students will begin the selection process with trials and training. Students will need to bring all safety equipment, sun safe hat, water bottle and appropriate shoes for their chosen sport on this day.
- If your child is successful in being selected in one of our school teams they will be receiving an information note indicating the cost and a permission slip within the next two weeks.

Students wishing not to play an interschool sport have chosen one of the below activities.

- **Ten Pin Bowling at the Mt Warren Bowling Lanes at a cost of \$6 each week for 7 weeks.**
- **Rotational Activities** where they will take part in a variety of activities such as indoor games and outdoor modified games at school.
- **Boot Camp** at a total cost of \$10. This group of students will be taken through 'boot camp' type fitness activities. These students will learn about healthy eating and keeping active.

## From the Guidance Officer

### Feeling Connected at School - Welcome to Mt Warren Park State School

When kids feel part of their school community and are cared for by people at their school, they are less likely to get into trouble. They also have higher levels of emotional well-being. This feeling of belonging, often called "connectedness," can be especially important during times of stress or when difficult decisions have to be made. Adults and peers, curricular and extracurricular activities, policies and practices all affect the level of connectedness your child feels at school.

This article:

- Defines school connectedness.
- Explains the importance of being connected to the school.
- Suggests ways for parents and teachers to help kids feel more connected at school.

### What Is School Connectedness?

These are some of the major elements that help kids feel they belong and are cared for at their school:

- Teachers who support and care for individual students.
- Good friends at school.
- Parents and students caring about current and future academic performance.
- Discipline policies that are fair and efficient.
- Participating in extracurricular activities

### Benefits of Connectedness

Some of the benefits of helping students feel a sense of connectedness to their school community are listed below.

- Academic benefits: "Connected" kids are more likely to attend school regularly, pay attention to their grades and pursue post-secondary education.
- Reducing risky behaviour: Students who feel a sense of belonging to the school community are less likely to be involved in risk-taking behaviour and

activities such as smoking, alcohol and substance abuse, drinking and driving

- Mental well-being: Connected kids are less likely to have emotional distress or experience abuse. They are able to handle stress effectively and are more resilient (that is, they can bounce back from stress).

**How Parents Can Help Kids Feel More Connected At School**  
**The first step** is to recognise the importance of school connectedness in your child's life and development. **Second**, use the information in the "What Is School Connectedness?" section above to assess your child's school situation.

**As a parent, you can take these steps to influence your child's level of connectedness:**

- Attend parent-teacher meetings and get to know all of your child's teachers through regular conversations.
- Be involved with the school. Go on field trips, volunteer and know what is happening at the school.
- Get to know your child's friends and their families, and encourage positive peer relationships.
- Talk to your children about their grades and effort, and access resources to help you ensure they are reaching their potential and taking ownership of their performance.
- Encourage your child to get involved in extracurricular options.

Your child's sense of belonging to school (connectedness) plays a key role, not only in academic success but also in decreasing risky behaviour and supporting mental wellbeing.

Talk with your children about how connected they feel at school. Above all, involve yourself in their school lives and be aware of what happens there, both negatively and positively.
