Features: The app integrates with the department's preferred school website platform, allowing users to:

- find and favourite your school by searching for the school by name, searching a map or by searching for schools near your current location
- receive real-time notifications about state-wide emergency alerts as well as school push notifications and important updates through the app
- access the latest news, events and newsletters from your school
- easily access your schools tuckshop and uniform shop information
- view information about your school including class times and contact details
- view social media feeds.

The app can manage updates from multiple schools which is useful for parents who have students in different schools.



OUR SCHOOL REVIEW – AN OPPORTUNITY TO HAVE YOUR SAY

Our school is scheduled for a priority support school review for Term 2, to be held from 11-13 April 2016. The Department of Education and Training introduced new performance reviews for Queensland state schools in 2015. The reviews are conducted by the department's School Improvement Unit.

The reviews do not rate or compare schools but provide independent and quality feedback to help schools continue to improve outcomes for students. All schools have a review at least every four years. Key findings from the review are made available to parents and the community on the school's website.

As part of the review, the review team would like to hear from our school community and I encourage anyone who is interested to have their say. Your feedback is important and will help us continue to deliver a quality education for students.

Feedback can be provided to the review team by phone or in person. All feedback remains confidential.

If you are interested in speaking to the reviewers, or would like more information about the review process, please contact the school office.

Review Process

Priority support reviews are conducted by a review team appointed by the School Improvement Unit.

The team consists of two internal reviewers from the unit and an external reviewer from outside the department. The make-up of the review team is tailored to the needs and context of the school.

Generally, priority support reviews are conducted over five to six days and provides a thorough assessment of a school's performance data, school operations, and other school information and resources to identify where and how the school can improve. The review team will engage in conversation with a range of staff, parents, students and the community, with the following meetings recommended:

- For schools needing extra support
- The School Improvement Unit identifies schools for priority support reviews using performance data trends and consultation with regions
- Reviews conducted by a review team consisting of two internal reviewers from the School Improvement Unit and an external reviewer from outside the department
- Reviews conducted over about five to six days depending on school size and complexity

Staff

- School leadership team (principal and deputy principals)
- Other school leaders (heads of department and curriculum)
- Administration team (business service manager, receptionist and other administration staff)
- Teachers and teacher aides
- Specialist support staff
- Other school staff.

School community

- P&C president or school council chair
- Parents and students
- Other community representatives (for example, local businesses and partnerships, and government representatives).



Students

Classroom observations are a valuable part of the review process. Where possible, they should be representative of the variety of classrooms and teaching practices within your school. Schools generally organise personnel to accompany reviewers during classroom visits to provide class relief and to allow the teacher to talk with a member of the review team.

The assistant regional director will also interviewed as part of the review. At the end of the review, the review team presents its findings and recommendations to the school's leadership team and assistant regional director.

A written report follows that details the findings and recommendations for the school to consider and respond to with the support of the region. The School Improvement Unit continues to support the school and regularly monitors the implementation and progress of the school's improvement strategies.

The final report will be published on our school's website and on the School Improvement Unit's webpage.

Community feedback is an important part of school reviews, with parents, students and the community encouraged to have their say. RESPECTFUL RELATIONSHIPS PROGRAM



The Department of Education and Training has developed the program (Prep to Year 12) as part of the Queensland Government's commitment to address domestic and family violence. The program has been developed in consultation with a range of stakeholders including teachers and school communities. Through respectful relationships education, students will learn the skills they need to develop respectful and ethical relationships free of violence.

The content of the Respectful relationships education program supports five hours of instruction per year level and is based on domestic and family violence research and best-practice educational approaches.

School communities are able to use the program as part of their whole-school approach to increasing awareness of domestic and family violence, and making their schools and communities a safer place for everyone.

The *Respectful relationships education program* is for Prep to Year 12. Five hours of instruction have been developed for each year level and it is recommended that sessions be delivered by school-based teachers as part of ongoing social and emotional learning.

Positive rapport between teachers and students will ensure a safe classroom environment where students feel comfortable to explore content without fear of judgment. Students achieve better outcomes from social and emotional learning programs in the context of supportive relationships that make learning challenging, engaging and meaningful.

Why respectful relationships education?

The *Respectful relationships education program* is part of a broader multi-departmental commitment to ending domestic and family violence. The program takes a primary prevention approach. In schools, primary prevention education is about positively influencing behavioural change in young people to prevent undesirable social consequences such as domestic and family violence.

A growing body of evidence shows that social and emotional learning of this nature leads to:

- improved social and emotional skills, self-concept, bonding to school, and positive classroom behaviour
- fewer conduct problems such as disruptive classroom behaviour, aggression, bullying and delinquent acts
- Reduced emotional distress such as depression, stress or social withdrawal.
- Studies also show that students perform better academically.

The role of parents and families is critically important in the education of young people. Families are the first educators of children — they have the potential to influence the social and emotional learning of their children because of the frequency of learning opportunities at home.

Personal Safety Survey (PSS), Australia 2012 — a snap shot

The Personal Safety Survey is the most comprehensive quantitative study of interpersonal violence in Australia. The survey is administered by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) and funded by the Australian Government's Department of Social Services. More than 17,000 women and men completed the 2012 survey. Some of the findings included:



- Violence is extremely common in Australia, with four out of ten women and five out of ten men having experienced at least one incidence of violence since the age of 15.
- Men are more likely to be victims of physical violence (one in two men and one in three women) while women are more likely to be victims of sexual violence (one in five women and one in 22 men).
- Both women and men are more than three times as likely to be physically assaulted by a man than by a woman.
- A man is most likely to experience violence in a place of entertainment and a woman is most likely to experience violence in her home.
- Seven out of ten men and five out of ten women said alcohol or other drugs contributed to their most recent physical assault by a male.
- 4.3 times as many women as men reported that they felt fear or anxiety after their most recent physical assault committed by an opposite sex perpetrator.
- Gender remains the most substantial variable when considering differences in patterns of victimisation and perpetration.

Scooter and Bikes



Please help us to keep our grounds safe by reminding your children not to ride their bikes and scooters through the school grounds. Bikes and scooters must be housed in the bike racks and please ensure that they are chained to the racks during the day. We recommend that skateboards are not brought to school as they cannot be chained up and they should not be taken to class.

Hair Style

Your child's hair should be styled in a neat and respectable manner. Coloured hair or outrageous styles are not permitted. This includes Mohawk style haircuts and tracks. You will be asked to correct such cuts.



Playground Equipment

Our school Workplace Health and Safety requirements need for us to ensure that school playground equipment is only to be used at the designated times during school hours and only by children authorised to use the equipment. Please ensure that children do not play on the playground equipment outside of school hours as we do not provide supervision at these times.

Please NAME ALL belongings!

Please ensure that all of your child's belongings are clearly named to prevent loss. Items can be easily misplaced during a busy school day, and naming items assists a swift return to their rightful owner. Name school bags, lunch boxes, water bottles, hats, homework folders and any other items that may travel with your child to school each day.

General School News

Cash Collection Procedures – Cash Window

The Cash Window is located in the Admin Block. We offer several methods of payment being cash, cheque, EFTPOS, B-Point (see above) and Internet Banking. The cash window will be **OPEN every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 8am to 10am.**

Late Payments - It is a solid requirement that all events be paid for by the due date which is stated on all permission / information notes sent home to parents.

Late payments cannot be accepted under any circumstances so please keep updated by checking our newsletter each fortnight.

Refunds - Refunds can only be given in part. This means if there is bus travel involved for the event this is **NOT** refundable. Whether your child attends or not the buses have been booked and need to be paid for. You must complete a "Refund Request" Form available from Administration.

Payment Due Dates - Every fortnight payment reminders are printed in the "General News" and "Dates To Remember" sections of the school newsletter (this is also available on our website).



Dance Groups - All children who have successfully gained a position in a Dance Group, have received an invoice attached to an information note. **All members must pay \$20 by Thursday 3 March.** Students who do not pay by this date will forfeit their position as there is a lengthy waiting list and the position must be offered to another.

Year 5 and 6 Gala Day - Netball, Touch Football, Soccer, Rugby League, AFL = \$40 per child and must be paid in full by Wednesday 9 March. Boot Camp costs \$10 and must be paid in full by Thursday 3 March. Ten Pin Bowling costs \$42 and must be paid in full by Thursday 25 February. All amounts must be paid in full by the designated due dates.

Gala Days for Years 5 & 6

Over the past couple weeks Mt Warren Park State School have been conducting training and sporting team selection processes for Rugby League, Girls Touch Football, Soccer and Netba.

If your child has been successful in gaining a position on one of the Mt Warren sporting teams to compete at the Interschool Gala Day competition, they will have received a note outlining all the relevant information. Please read, discuss and complete with your child the **Code of Conduct**. This must be returned with the **permission slip** to your sporting coach by **Friday 26th February**.

The students will travel to and from the sporting venue by bus. This year, all participants in the Gala Day interschool sport competition will be required to pay a \$5.00 facilities levy for both winter and summer Gala Days, this levy is to help subsidise the cleaning of the facilities and the venue hire.

The cost for Term 1/2 which covers 5 competition days and includes the \$5 venue levy and bus travel is **\$40.00 and must be paid in full by Wednesday 9th March 2016.** Invoices will be issued to relevant students for their sport.

Competition Dates for Term 1: Friday 11th, 18th March. Term 2: 15th, 22nd and 29th April.

Ten Pin Bowling – First bowling date is this Friday 26th February

The students in the Ten Pin Bowling group will participate in their first bowling session on Friday 26th February. Due to the financial requirements of Education Queensland we are now required to invoice each student for the total amount for the 7 weeks. The total amount will be \$42. Each student will receive an invoice indicating this. **\$42.00 and must be paid in full by Thursday 25th February 2016.**

Boot Camp

If your year 5 or 6 child has chosen Boot Camp for their Friday sport they will experience a Fitness Program conducted by qualified fitness instructor Brent Nichol. The Boot Camp will be held in our school auditorium and will commence this Friday 26th February and continue on the following dates 4th, 11th and 18th March and then in term 2 on the 15th, 22nd and 29th April. To participate in Boot Camp Program your child must read and sign a behaviour contract, you must agree to pay the full cost \$10 and **remain committed for the duration of 7 weeks.** The completed permission slip, medical information and behaviour contract must be returned to Mrs Bennett. The cost for Boot Camp is **\$10.00 and must be paid in full by 3rd March 2016.**

From the Guidance Officer

Early Intervention

'Early Intervention' is a term that is commonly used by educators, professionals, and politicians. The words are clear – 'early intervention' means 'intervening early'. When a person shows signs of risk, whether it be mental, physical, learning or other disorders then the earlier that actions are put in place to treat the problem the more successful the outcome is likely to be. It is better to respond to red flags than to get to crisis point. Actions may take the form of medical intervention, family support, school involvement, and/or involvement of community agencies.

For children who are exhibiting learning or social issues, parents can access support through their GP, who can refer them to medical specialists or speech pathologist/ physios, occupational therapists, psychologists, paediatrician.

Early education facilities exist for pre-school children (from 0 to 5 years) with more severe difficulties to access services.

For children who exhibit behavioural or mental health issues your GP is your first stop. An estimated 14-20% of children and adolescents aged 4-17 are affected by a mental health or behavioural problems every year, but only one in four receives any professional help. Schools now have in place support through early intervention for children and young people who are at highest risk of developing

mental health problems, or who are showing early behavioural signs or symptoms of mental health problems.

While the first 5 years of life (including from conception) are crucial and early detection of problems can help rectify or put in place services to manage the problem, early intervention at any age is crucial for a better outcome.
